## **Opinion**

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of Mary's Place by the Sea, Inc. (a nonprofit organization) which comprise the statement of financial position as of March 31, 2023, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Mary's Place by the Sea, Inc. as of March 31, 2023 and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

## **Basis for Opinion**

I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am required to be independent of Mary's Place by the Sea, Inc. and to meet my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to my audit. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

## Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Mary's Place by the Sea, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

# Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepting auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepting auditing standards, I:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Mary's Place by the Sea, Inc.'s internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in my judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Mary's Place by the Sea, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

I am required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that I identified during the audit.

## Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies -

<u>Nature of Activities</u> - The Organization is a nonprofit corporation which provides support for women with cancer in a respite home located in Ocean Grove, New Jersey through integrative services which complement their medical treatment and empower, educate and support their healing. Services provided include oncology massage, individual counseling sessions, nutritional counseling, guided meditation, reflexology, journaling, yoga and overall support. The Organization relies on grants and donations to fund its operations as it does not charge its guests for services.

<u>Basis of Presentation</u> - The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets that are based upon the existence or absence of restrictions on use that are placed by its donors: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

<u>Without donor restrictions</u> - Resources available to support operations and are not subject to donor restrictions.

<u>With donor restrictions</u> - Resources that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions. When a donor's restriction is satisfied, either by using the resources in the manner specified by the donor or by the passage of time, the expiration of the restriction is reported in the financial statements by reclassifying the net assets from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions.

Contributions - Unconditional promises to give are recognized as revenue when the underlying promises are received by the Organization. If there is no unconditional promise, the contribution is recognized when received. Contributions received are recorded as support without donor restrictions or support with donor restrictions according to donor stipulations that limit the use of these assets due to time or purpose restrictions. Grants and other contributions of cash and other assets are reported as support with donor restrictions if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Contributed Services - During the year ended March 31, 2023, the value of contributed services meeting the requirements for recognition in the financial statements totaled \$107,061 which was for professional services and specialized skills. No amounts have been reflected in the financial statements for other contributed services; however, a substantial number of volunteers have donated significant amounts of their time in relation to the Organization's program services and other activities.

### Note 1 - (continued)

Gifts in Kind - The Organization received in kind donations for the year ended March 31, 2023 totaling \$116,123. The value of these contributions is reflected in the financial statements at fair value at the date of receipt. The amounts recorded in the financial statements for in kind donations are as follows:

Contributions Receivable - Any unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected within one year are recorded at net realizable value. Unconditional promises to give that are expected to be collected in future years are recorded at fair value, which is measured as the present value of their future cash flows. The discounts on those amounts are computed using risk-adjusted interest rates applicable to the years in which the promises are received. Amortization of the discounts is included in contribution revenue. Conditional promises to give are not included as support until the conditions are substantially met. As of March 31, 2023, the Organization had no contributions receivable.

Revenue Recognition - The Organization has adopted the guidance under FASB ASC 606, Revenue from Contracts with Members, which requires the recognition of revenue when promised services are transferred to members in an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Organization expects to be entitled in exchange for those services.

<u>Grants</u> - Grants are recognized when received and are reviewed by the <u>Organization</u> for the amount earned and, if necessary, adjusted at year end.

<u>Property and Equipment</u> - Property and equipment are carried at cost. Depreciation and amortization are computed using the straight line and accelerated methods based on the estimated useful lives of the assets. Expenditures for major renewals and betterments that extend the useful lives of property and equipment are capitalized. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expense, as incurred. Depreciation and amortization expense for the year was \$74,914.

Donations of property and equipment are recorded as support at their estimated fair value. Such donations are reported as support without donor restrictions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash that must be used to acquire property and equipment are reported as support with donor restrictions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, the Organization reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service as instructed by the donor. The Organization reclassifies net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions at that time.

Advertising - All advertising costs are expensed in the period they are incurred. For the year ended March 31, 2023, advertising expense was \$32,047, which included donated advertising services of \$6,220.

# Note 1 - (continued)

<u>Income Taxes</u> - The Organization is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Organization evaluates its uncertain tax positions and accordingly, a loss contingency is recognized when it is probable that a liability has been incurred as of the date of the financial statements and the amount of the loss can be reasonably estimated. The amount recognized is subject to estimate and management judgment with respect to the likely outcome of each uncertain tax position. The amount that is ultimately sustained for an individual uncertain tax position or for all uncertain tax positions in the aggregate could differ from the amount recognized. As of March 31, 2023, the Organization recognized no liability on uncertain tax positions.

<u>Investments</u> - The Organization's investments in marketable securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are reported at their fair values in the statement of financial position. Unrealized gains and losses are included in the change in net assets. Investment income and gains restricted by a donor are reported as increases in unrestricted net assets if the restrictions are met (either by passage of time or by use) in the reporting period in which the income and gains are recognized. For the year ended March 31, 2023, the Organization incurred investment expenses of \$2,506 which is reflected in the investment income on the statement of activities.

<u>Fair Value</u> - The Organization has a number of financial instruments, none of which are held for trading purposes. The Organization estimates that the fair value of all financial instruments at March 31, 2023, does not differ materially from the aggregate carrying values of its financial instruments recorded in the accompanying balance sheet. The estimated fair value amounts have been determined by the Organization using available market information and appropriate valuation methodologies. Marketable equity securities are valued at quoted prices in active markets for identical assets (Level I). Considerable judgment is necessarily required in interpreting market data to develop the estimates of fair value, and, accordingly, the estimates are not necessarily indicative of the amounts that the Organization could realize in a current market exchange.

<u>Use of Estimates</u> - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Management periodically evaluates estimates used in the preparation of the financial statements for continued reasonableness. Appropriate adjustments, if any, to the estimates used are made prospectively based upon such periodic evaluation.

Note 3 - Mortgage Payable - The Organization has a mortgage with OceanFirst Bank of which \$703,579 was outstanding as of March 31, 2023. The mortgage, secured by the Ocean Grove property, is payable in monthly installments of \$9,760, including interest at 3.9% in the current year. The mortgage will adjust to a rate equal to 3.5% in excess of the U.S. Treasury Securities. The next rate adjustment is June 2026. The mortgage is due December 2036.

The Organization adopted the requirements in FASB ASC 835-30 to present debt issuance costs as a reduction of the carrying amount of the debt rather than as an asset. Amortization of the debt issuance costs is reported as interest expense in the statement of functional expenses.

Note 6 - <u>Functional Allocation of Expenses</u> - The costs of providing programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the statement of functional expenses. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefited. Directly identifiable expenses are charged to the programs and supporting services. Expenses related to more than one function are charged to programs and supporting services on the basis of periodic time and expense studies. Management and general expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide for the overall support and direction of the Organization.

Note 7 - Operating Lease - The Organization leases office equipment under an operating lease for a term of five years. The lease expense was \$2,233 for the year ended March 31, 2023. Under FASB ASC 842, a lease is recognized as a right-of-use asset with a related lease liability for the remainder of the lease term. The Organization did not adopt ASC 842 as the lease was not material and was not capitalized.

- Note 8 <u>Cash Flows</u> For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents. For the year ended March 31, 2023, the Organization paid \$30,443 for interest expense.
- Note 9 <u>Transactions with Related Parties</u> The Organization incurred expenses of \$2,440 to a vendor for website design, of which \$1,220 was donated services. The vendor is owned by a cousin of the Executive Director of the Organization. The Organization incurred expenses of \$1,522 to a contractor for repair services. The contractor is the brother-in-law of the Executive Director of the Organization.
- Note 10 <u>Concentrations of Credit Risk</u> The Organization maintains cash balances at financial institutions which are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. At March 31, 2023, the Organization's uninsured cash totaled \$110,511.
- Note 11 <u>Subsequent Events</u> The Organization has evaluated subsequent events through November 16, 2023, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No subsequent events requiring recognition or disclosure in the financial statements were identified by management.
